



In Memory of David Dearborn

This past winter we lost a past president and active member of Campton Historical Society. His presence will be missed and the front left of the hall will have a void during program nights. Here are a few reminiscences of Dave by Jessica and Ian Halm. Please send us your memories so we can add them to his legacy.

- * Dave's love of steam engines and his infamous steam engine shows helped put Campton on the map (well, at least among other steam engine buffs).
- * Dave and Jacquie's home was like an historical museum itself, with so many unique antiques, and Dave's charismatic explanation of each one.
- * Dave would have been an excellent candidate to interview for the oral history project, and his untimely death makes the importance of this project really hit home
- * Dave was always wanting to share his knowledge and love of steam engines. He often remarked how he wished a youngster (or two or more!) would stop by and "apprentice" with him.
- * Dave was a skilled machinist. He could fix anything, and more importantly, he had the patience to do so!
- * The best days in Campton were marked by seeing Dave and Jacquie driving around in their 1909 Jackson Model H Touring Car.
